Yield To Be Healed

Matthew 20:29-34 – NKJV - Two Blind Men Receive Their Sight

²⁹ Now as they went out of Jericho, a great multitude followed Him. ³⁰ And behold, two blind men sitting by the road, when they heard that Jesus was passing by, cried out, saying, "**Have mercy on us**, O Lord, Son of David!" ³¹ Then the multitude warned them that they should be quiet; but they cried out all the more, saying, "**Have mercy on us**, O Lord, Son of David!" ³² So Jesus stood still and called them, and said, "**What do you want Me to do for you?**"

³³ They said to Him, "Lord, that our eyes may be opened." ³⁴ So Jesus had compassion and touched their eyes. And immediately their eyes received sight, and they followed Him.

In verse 29, we see that there is <u>a great multitude following Jesus</u>.

- It would be easy for the enemy to convince us - -
- We are <u>insignificant</u> compared to everyone else.
- That our problems are **not** all that **<u>important</u>**.

But verse 30 tells us about these 2 blind men.

- I like that there are <u>2 blind men in this text</u> - -
- Because <u>1 blind man might say</u> to someone <u>they are alone</u> - -
- And the only one with that problem.

But notice that there are two people with identical problems.

Sometimes we may feel like we are t<u>he only one who has a certain problem</u> in our lives - - -

You might be surprised to find out that you are not alone.

- I think *that's important* to realize - -
- Because being all-alone is a very lonely place to be - -
- Especially when you are suffering.

<u>Matthew 20:30</u> – NKJV - ³⁰ And behold, two blind men sitting by the road, when they heard that Jesus was passing by, <u>cried out</u>, saying, "Have mercy on us, O Lord, Son of David!"

The scripture here says that they "cried out."

Now there have been some times in my life when I've cried out.

I've cried out a few times in my life

• It wasn't always because I was in some kind of physical pain.

But of all the people that were there that day, these two people <u>are the only</u> <u>ones</u> "*crying out*" at that moment.

It makes me wonder <u>what all had gone on in their lives</u> to get them to the point of finally "**crying out.**"

We don't naturally or easily "<u>cry out</u>" to God.

Generally we try to take care of the problem ourselves.

- We try to fix the issue with our own abilities.
- Our own <u>resources</u> Our own <u>talents</u> Our own <u>strength</u>.

We don't usually <u>yield</u> to God right away.

• It generally takes some 'bumps on the head' first.

Like the woman with the issue of blood (Matthew 9:20)

We usually turn to Jesus after we have - - -

- Already spent all that we have
- On the things that we think should help us
- But what ultimately makes us worse
- Than we were in the beginning.

Jesus is not always our first resort when something is going on in our lives.

Sometimes we turn to all kinds of stuff long before - - -

- We finally in desperation turn to Him. YIELD
- At that point, it's more of a "crying out" than a "giving In."
- "Have Mercy"

Like <u>He would only help you</u> because you are <u>finally begging</u> for the help...

With all the stuff that goes on in the world at times, and what goes on in our personal lives, we find it hard to yield to God.

To stop and say, "Ok, Lord. I can't do this by myself. I need your help."

There are multiple examples of people in the scripture who obviously had problems in their lives,

- But as they <u>yielded</u> more and more to His presence and <u>His will</u> -
- He was able to work in their situations.

It was **not until <u>they reached out to Him</u> that <u>He was able</u> to do something for them.**

- The woman with the issue of blood.
- The man with the withered hand.
- The leprous men who cried out to Him.

These were people who for many years, if not their whole lives

- Struggled not only with personal and physical challenges
- But also the emotional wounds and scars.

The social stigma of it all, *limited who they were and what they were capable of.*

- All the pain, the suffering, and mental anguish - -
- Until finally *they cried out to God*. <u>YIELD</u>

Until finally they said, "I can't do this by myself, I need God's help."

Sometimes we are <u>burdened with so much</u> we forget that <u>God wants to</u> <u>lift that burden off of us</u>.

Luke 10:38-42 – NKJV - Mary and Martha Worship and Serve

³⁸ Now it happened as they went that He entered a certain village; and a certain woman named Martha welcomed Him into her house.

³⁹ And she had a sister called Mary, who also sat at Jesus' feet and heard His word.

⁴⁰ But Martha was distracted with much serving, and she approached Him and said, "Lord, do You not care that my sister has left me to serve alone? Therefore tell her to help me."

⁴¹ And Jesus answered and said to her, "Martha, Martha, you are worried and troubled about many things.

⁴² But one thing is needed, and Mary has chosen that good part, which will not be taken away from her."

He told Martha, "You're busy about so many things. Mary, she's being sensitive and you are being busy; right now is a time to be sensitive."

Right now is a time to <u>hear from God</u>.

We need to recognize those times in our lives when

- God is speaking to us
- When He is trying to direct and guide our lives.

We think that **being busy is an excuse** to not make time for God and give <u>Him opportunity to speak into our lives</u>.

We'd rather <u>put on a great feast for Him</u> when all the while <u>*He just wants*</u> to sit and talk to our hearts for a little while.

We wonder sometimes <u>why He doesn't</u> answer our prayers when we want Him to.

- We wonder sometimes why the job
- or the <u>health</u>
- or the <u>family</u>
- **Doesn't change** right when we first ask.

Many times it's because as James 4:3 says...

James 4:3 – NKJV - ³ You ask and do not receive, because you ask a miss, that you may spend *it* on your pleasures (lusts).

We don't really know what to pray for. All we are doing is <u>responding to circumstances</u> that <u>we are going through</u> and <u>the pain that we are going through</u>.

What we don't realize is that God is working something out for us - - -

He needs us to <u>yield</u> to Him. He needs us to <u>turn to Him</u>.

We are going in <u>all different directions</u>, doing <u>all kinds of things</u>, trying this and trying that, and <u>even praying for the wrong things</u>, but **Jesus is saying**, **'STOP!' <u>YIELD</u>**

Romans 6:16 – NKJV - ¹⁶ Do you not know that to whom you present yourselves <u>slaves to obey</u>, you are that one's slaves whom you obey, whether of <u>sin *leading* to death</u>, or of <u>obedience *leading* to righteousness</u>?

Here is the problem for many of us much of the time.

We don't want to "<u>Yield</u>."

I love green lights, but I hate red lights.

<u>Green</u> means go.

- That's what <u>I want to do</u>.
- I want to get to where <u>I want to go</u>.

But that <u>red</u> light means stop.

- I hate stopping.
- Stopping makes me late.
- Stopping keeps me from getting where <u>I want to go</u>.
- Stopping gets in the way of my agenda.

And then there are these little triangle yellow signs at certain intersections that mean, <u>"Yield."</u>

- Now a lot of people say to yield signs, "Huh?"
- I wonder what I was supposed to be looking out for?

In fact, much of the time we totally ignore the <u>Yield</u> sign. Why?

- Because we have <u>an agenda</u>.
- We have <u>a direction</u> we want to go.
- We have <u>a destination</u> to get to.

But what that <u>Yield</u> sign is saying to the traveler is to '<u>give way</u>' to the people who are coming from the other direction.

Let them go first. Slow down. Stop if you have to. Pull over even. Let them go instead of you.

We wonder why Jesus hasn't stepped into our situation sometimes.

Could it be that we are in too big of a hurry trying to do things ourselves to just **'yield'** and let Him do what He wants to do in our lives at that moment?

<u>Revelation 3:20</u> – NKJV - 20 Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears My voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and dine with him, and he with Me.

How many of us can say that we truly feel that God has come into our situation.

- That His presence can be felt.
- That **His Spirit** is operating in the situations of our homes
- and in our lives.

His Spirit wants to work in our lives.

He said, in the latter part of Isaiah 43:13...

Isaiah 43:13 – NKJV - ¹³ Indeed before the day *was,* I *am* He; And *there is* no one who can deliver out of My hand; I work, and who will reverse it?"

When we <u>yield</u> to Him,

- We open up a realm that's not available to most people - -
- Because it's only open to those who yield to Him.

Those that open the door.

- Those who cry out.
- Those who are willing to do whatever He says to do, to be in His will.

It's really only open to those who *yield* themselves.

That's why <u>prayer is so important</u>, because it <u>opens the lines of</u> <u>communication</u> to God.

- Our prayer needs to be more than, "Hey God, I need your help."
- As some last minute desperate cry for help.

And it's not just something that we do when something terrible is going on in our lives.

• It's something that we do throughout the day.

Luke 18:1 – NKJV - The Parable of the Persistent Widow 18 Then He spoke a parable to them, that men always ought to pray and not lose heart,

In other words - - -

- Let those lines of <u>communication with God</u> be open all the time.
- Don't allow circumstances to keep you from communicating with Him.

Sometimes, all of this "stuff called life" can really discourage us and cause us to doubt and wonder.

But in the middle of all of the doubting - - -

- We must <u>YIELD</u>!!!!
- Come to a place of *yielding*, saying, "I give" to the Lord.

Not allowing our flesh to get in the way of what God is trying to do - - -

He is trying to work <u>in each of our lives</u>. He is trying to work <u>out the complexities</u> of it all.

He's trying to <u>help us find our way</u>. He's trying <u>to heal us</u>. He's trying <u>to minister to us</u>. He's trying to <u>guide us and help us</u> **become closer to Him.**

CLOSE:

It takes us <u>yielding to Him</u> and <u>allowing Him to work</u> in our lives.

- Giving in and letting go
- When we want to fight to hang onto
- Things that prevent us from fulfilling his purpose in our lives.

There does need to come a point where we say, *"I give this to you God." I'M YIELDED*!!!!

There has to come a point where we say, *"I can't fight this battle any longer."*

This battle belongs to you. - <u>YIELD</u>

And when we give it to Him, it's a fearful thing.

When we give it to Him

- we put it in the hands of a jealous God,
- an angry God,
- a loving God,
- a God who is touched by the feelings of our infirmities,
- a God who is compassionate,
- a God who is our Heavenly Father,
- a God who would give His own life
- so that we could have a relationship and salvation with Him.

This God that we serve,

He is well able to help us through our storms. He's able to calm the seas. He's able to say "Peace be still," but He's waiting for someone to say, "I need your help, I can't do this on my own."

He is waiting for us to Yield.
