Why Did You Stop At The Cross?

The Army of Gideon

In <u>judges chapter 6</u> there is the story of a man named <u>Gideon</u> who is hiding under a tree and behind a wine press threshing wheat.

It says that he is hiding because he does not want the Midianites to find out that he has wheat.

While he is doing this an angel comes up to him and says, "The LORD is with thee, thou mighty man of valor."

- Gideon did not think of himself as a brave man or a man of war.
- Yet the angel tells him to take his "might" and go defeat the Midianites.

Gideon responds that he has no might.

- He says that he is the <u>youngest member</u> of the one of the <u>smallest families</u> in the smallest tribe of Manasseh.
- In fact Manasseh is only <u>referred to as a half-tribe</u>.

Yet the angel of the Lord tells him:

<mark>Judges 6:14</mark> - NIV

¹⁴The Lord turned to him and said, "Go in the strength you have and save Israel out of Midian's hand. *Am I not sending you*?"

• Notice that phrase, **Am I not sending you**?

Always remember that the Lord give us two things: talents/abilities and authority

1. Talents/abilities

- When the Lord gives us abilities we are free to do with them as we wish.
- When I was younger I was scared of speaking in front of people.
- Yet over time I developed my talent for speaking in front of groups.

2. Authority

• To become a minister, however, requires more than talent; it requires authority as well.

You must have both <u>ability</u> and <u>authority</u>.

When the **Lord** asks you to do something, he has already given you both.

You have two answers that you can give: I will, or I won't.

You see there is no possibility of answering, "I can't" because you can.

The Lord has given you the authority and the ability.

- There is no question in his mind - -
- That you can do the thing that he has asked.
- To you it may seem like an impossible task - -
- But the **Lord** has <u>already worked it out</u>.

Take Gideon, for example,

- He is certain that he has neither talent nor ability
- To defeat a mighty army like the Midianites.

Yet the Lord sends him on this mission with the authority of God

- The question, "<u>Am I not sending you</u>?"
- The Lord has given **Gideon the** authority.
- But what about the ability?

Where is the army?

- Gideon raises an army from the local people.
- Over <u>32,000 men</u> arrived to help defeat this common enemy.

Now the Lord told Gideon

- That there were too many people so he should *reduce the number*.
- In the natural world this would seem like a stupid thing to do.
- The Midianites had a great army!

Why would anyone think that an army could be too big?

- A large army represents **strength**.
- A large army represents <u>security</u>.
- But God said that they were <u>too dependent on</u> their own <u>power</u>.
- Excuse me, God, but are you out of your mind?

Gideon follows the direction of the Lord

- Sends 22,000 men home, leaving him with 10,000.
- But the Lord says, "That is still too many."

Excuse me, God, but are you out of your mind?

At each point, **Gideon has the <u>ability</u>** to <u>refuse</u> God's command.

- He can say, "I will," or "I won't."
- He has the ability to send men away, so he can't say, "I can't."
- So **Gideon reduces** the number down again to 300.
- He gives those men a lamp and a trumpet.
- They surround the <u>enemy's camp</u> - -

Look at what they do next:

Judges 7:20 - NIV

²⁰ The three companies blew the trumpets and smashed the jars. Grasping the torches in their left hands and holding in their right hands the trumpets they were to blow, they shouted, "A sword for the LORD and for Gideon!"

Notice the timing of this.

- God has reduced the army to 300 men.
- Those 300 men give a shout of praise.
- They are <u>not</u> shouting because <u>they have won</u> the battle.
- Anyone can shout <u>after you have won</u> the battle.
- These men are <u>shouting before the battle</u> has even begun.

Look at what happens:

Judges 7:21 - NIV

²¹ While each man <u>held his position</u> around the camp, all the Midianites ran, crying out as they fled.

- The battle was <u>not</u> won when <u>32,000</u> men showed up <u>ready for battle</u>.
- The battle was <u>not</u> won when that number was <u>reduced to 10,000</u>.
- Neither was the battle won when the final number was 300.

God had the battle plan in mind.

- God had <u>the victory</u> in His head
- All of these actions were performed as preliminaries.
- The tide turned for the army of Gideon when they shouted the victory
- WHEN they <u>praised God</u> before <u>the battle</u> even began.

When the army <u>broke their lamps</u> and <u>shouted to God</u>, that is when <u>the enemy</u> panicked and **the battle was won**.

The Battle of Jericho

Joshua came into the Promised Land with an army of people.

- They left **Egypt** as slaves
- But in the course of **40 years** in the desert
- They have been **transformed** into an army.

The first place they come to is a town called Jericho, which has mighty walls.

- The walls are so high and so thick
- that they even *sell apartments* in them.
- We know this because *Rahab lived in one* of them.

As these fighting men approached the City, they said,

- "OK God, where <u>should we attack first</u>?
- Should we <u>attack the gates</u> directly?
- Or should we just *cut off their supplies* until they <u>starve to death?</u>"

The Lord said, "I want you to march around the outside of the city."

- OK, march around the outside. Good idea.
- Let them get <u>a good look **at us**</u>.
- It will also give us the opportunity to assess their defenses.

OK, God, we marched around Jericho yesterday; what should we do today?"

- The Lord said, "I want you to march around the outside of the city."
- Again? OK.

For six days they went around the city.

- For six days, **nothing happened**.
- I am sure that the army was getting discouraged.
- "For six days we have been marching around this city.
- It's day seven, God.
- I suppose you want us to <u>march around one more time</u>?"
- "No."
- "Really? Ok I'm ready to attack. Where should we start?"

[&]quot;<u>I want</u> you to march around the city <u>seven times</u>."

"I think you mean, 'seventh time,' right. Yesterday was the sixth time and today is the seventh. So you want us to march around a seventh time, right?"

"No, I want you to march around seven times today."

- So once again our heroes are *presented with the same dilemma*.
- HOW do you answer God?
- Do you say, "I will" or "I won't?"

Certainly it **was not** a problem <u>with walking once</u> they had <u>marched around the</u> <u>city six times</u> already.

The <u>choice</u> presented to <u>Joshua</u> and the rest of the <u>Israelite army</u> was

• Will I do what the Lord asks, or will I refuse?"

Sometimes when the Lord asks us to do things that make no sense to us - - -

- We refuse to answer His call.
- Perhaps we even get discouraged or angry with God.

"God, I have been marching around this city day after day.

- You have not explained to me how this has any bearing on the battle.
- You are just <u>making fun of me</u>, aren't you?
- You are <u>supposed to be helping</u> me.
- Instead you are making me waste my time."

But if we look at what **Joshua** did, we **see how** <u>**God**</u> **wants this to work**. **Joshua 6:20** - NIV

²⁰ When the trumpets sounded, the army shouted, and at the sound of the trumpet, when the men gave a loud shout, the wall collapsed; so everyone charged straight in, and they took the city.

The people **did not** shout because <u>the walls came down</u>; the <u>walls came down</u> <u>because</u> **the people shouted**.

There was no gradual shrinking of the walls with every lap around the city

- When the walls came down they came down all at once.
- The walls came down <u>after the shout of praise</u>.

If you want <u>Victory</u> over your situation, you need to give a shout of <u>praise</u> to <u>God</u>. Your shout of praise is what causes <u>God's victory</u> to occur.

Many of us say, "I will praise God the moment that he solves this problem for me."

But the Bible clearly shows us that the Lord does not bring victory first

- Then <u>hope</u> that we <u>shout praises</u>
- He brings victory after we shout praise.

Some of you have been waiting for the Lord to answer your prayer.

- Maybe you may have been unemployed for a while.
- You had a large army of George Washington's waiting in your 401K.
- But like Gideon's army yours keeps dwindling away.
- No matter what you do there always seem to be another bill to pay.
- Your once mighty army of money is getting smaller and smaller.

Maybe you are like Joshua at Jericho.

You have been walking in circles over and over again.

- You have been **trying to do what the Lord asks** but <u>you feel like nothing is</u> getting accomplished.
- You feel like **you are just going in circles** and the Lord is sending you around and around **without any concern** for actually solving your problem.

The Lord is here today to tell someone that the time for <u>reducing your army</u> is over.

- The time for **going in circles** is past.
- The victory is all set but you need to shout some praise.

You won't see the victory that is set to come in your life.

- To you everything seems as bleak as it ever has
- But the Lord has arranged for a great victory.

He needs you to cause that victory to happen.

You need to get up out of your seat and shout for a victory from the Lord.

The Battle of the Cross

Jesus had a really bad day. He was put on trial by the Jews.

He was <u>handed over to the Gentiles</u> and **beaten so severely** that most people would not have **survived.**

Then he was <u>handed over to the Jews again</u> in the form of <u>Herod where he was</u> ridiculed some more.

Then the **Gentiles humiliated** him <u>by taking off all of his clothes</u> **hanging him on a cross** specifically <u>so that everyone could see him</u>.

Yet many of us endure the embarrassment that the Devil has put on us and we stop.

- We <u>refuse</u> to go on.
- We say that if the Lord wants me to be on the cross then that is where I will stay.
- If the Lord <u>wants to humiliate me</u> then so be it,
- But do not ask me to thank him for it.

The Lord asks us to give praise, and we have the option we always have: do we say, "I will" or "I won't?"

⁵⁰ And when Jesus had cried out again in a loud voice, he gave up his spirit.

Matthew 27:51 - NIV

⁵¹ At that moment the curtain of the temple was torn in two from top to bottom. The earth shook, the rocks split

Jesus did not shout because the earth quaked; **the earth quaked** <u>because</u> <u>he</u> **shouted with a loud voice**.

The shout of praise is what completed the victory.

"There can be no victory without the cross."

- I am here to tell you that if you stop at the cross
- You will <u>never go on to victory</u>.

Why did you stop at the Cross?

Some of you have been struggling for too long in your job, your marriage, your whatever.

- You feel like the struggle has been futile.
- You wonder why you even bother coming to church if there is no victory.
- I am here to tell someone that the Lord has prepared your victory.
- You need to stand and shout to the Lord to cause that victory.

There is not victory in the cross; the victory is in the resurrection.

• The <u>resurrection</u> comes <u>after the shout</u>.

Why did you stop at the cross?

Why won't you shout for that victory you've been praying for?
