The Power Of 'Nevertheless'

In the English vocabulary, there are a handful of words that can <u>change the entire</u> <u>context</u> of a <u>sentence</u>, a <u>conversation</u>, even <u>the outcome</u> of an entire situation.

In our text today, <u>a single word has changed</u>, in a multitude of ways, entire dialogues, entire situations, and even an entire world, simply by the power of one simple word: <u>NEVERTHELESS</u>

Definition

- In the Old Testament, the original <u>Hebrew</u> means, strangely enough, "a ceasing, an end, a finality"
- In the New Testament Greek, in Luke's writing, the word "nevertheless" is used: "after negative sentences", and "serves to mark a transition to something new".
- <u>In Mark's writing</u>, however, "NEVERTHELESS" is used as "an opposition to concession"

This simply means that, although the speaker does not want to yield, or concede, to circumstances, *they have submitted* <u>their own will</u> through the power of *'nevertheless'*.

• Finally, from <u>the American Heritage Dictionary</u>, in today's English grammar, the word simply means, *"In spite of all that..."*

What I want to do today is point out to us, both as individuals, and as a church body, the power and strength that lies in a simple word: <u>NEVERTHELESS</u>.

From a positive to a negative - Numbers 13:23-33 - \mathbf{NKJV}

²³ Then they came to the Valley of Eshcol, and there cut down a branch with one cluster of grapes; they carried it between two of them on a pole. *They* also *brought* some of the pomegranates and figs.

²⁴ The place was called the Valley of Eshcol, because of the cluster which the men of Israel cut down there.

²⁵ And they returned from spying out the land after forty days.

²⁶ Now they departed and came back to Moses and Aaron and all the congregation of the children of Israel in the Wilderness of Paran, at Kadesh; they brought back word to them and to all the congregation, and showed them the fruit of the land.

²⁷ Then they told him, and said: "We went to the land where you sent us. It truly flows with milk and honey, and this *is* its fruit.

²⁸ <u>Nevertheless</u> the people who dwell in the land *are* strong; the cities *are* fortified *and* very large; moreover we saw the descendants of Anak there.

²⁹ The Amalekites dwell in the land of the South; the Hittites, the Jebusites, and the Amorites dwell in the mountains; and the Canaanites dwell by the sea and along the banks of the Jordan."

³⁰ Then Caleb quieted the people before Moses, and said, "Let us go up at once and take possession, for we are well able to overcome it."

³¹ But the men who had gone up with him said, "We are not able to go up against the people, for they *are* stronger than we."

³² And they gave the children of Israel a bad report of the land which they had spied out, saying, "The land through which we have gone as spies *is* a land that devours its inhabitants, and all the people whom we saw in it *are* men of *great* stature.

³³ There we saw the giants (the descendants of Anak came from the giants); and we were like grasshoppers in our own sight, and so we were in their sight."

In our story in Num. 13, "nevertheless" changes a positive to a negative.

Follow the story of the 12 spies, and you'll discover that, to a man, every one of them experienced the wonder of Canaan.

- It wasn't just *Joshua and Caleb* that pulled down a bunch of grapes.
- It wasn't just *Joshua and Caleb* that ate the fruit of the land 'til juice was dripping from their chin.

However, *in 10 of the spies*, **there was a "<u>nevertheless</u>"** that changed the entire picture.

- They witnessed <u>God's Promises</u>, but couldn't trust <u>His protection</u>.
- God did not lead them to this point just to leave them wishing, "If only".

But 85% of the spies used <u>THE POWER OF 'NEVERTHELESS'</u> to change a <u>positive</u> "we saw" into a <u>negative</u> "we can't".

Their attitude was <u>"Yes, there's plenty of promise in the land</u> that we spied out, but <u>in spite of all that</u>..."

It was this "Nevertheless" that became "<u>an end</u>, <u>a ceasing</u>, <u>a finality</u>", *because it* stopped <u>what GOD wanted</u> to do for Israel. HOW ABOUT US????

From a negative to a positive - Luke 5:4-6- NKJV

⁴When He had stopped speaking, He said to Simon, "Launch out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch."

⁵ But Simon answered and said to Him, "Master, we have toiled all night and caught nothing; <u>nevertheless</u> at Your word I will let down the net."

⁶And when they had done this, they caught a great number of fish, and their net was breaking.

Someone once said that *it takes both* negative and positive to start a vehicle.

That may be so, but give me a positive charge any day of the week!

In Luke's recording of the miracle of the fishes, we experience THE POWER OF 'NEVERTHELESS' changing a negative to a positive.

Simon Peter really <u>didn't want to</u> throw his nets out again.

- He'd just spent the morning <u>cleaning them</u>. (See vs. 2)
- He was a fisherman by trade, and knew the waters.
- His own expertise told him there was <u>no</u> reason to try again.

And he even went so far as to inform the Lord that "We've already tried..."

However, Simon used **THE POWER OF** '<u>NEVERTHELESS</u>' to change *a negative to a positive*.

You see, Simon had tasted futility, **but trusted in** *<u>the faithfulness</u> of the Master*.

- Once again, THE POWER OF '<u>NEVERTHELESS</u>' had <u>worked its magic</u>:
- "Lord, we've worked these waters all night long and haven't caught the first thing...but <u>in spite of all that</u>..."

It was this "Nevertheless" that, in the Greek form, "served to mark <u>a transition</u> to something new"

• It was here that *Jesus called His disciples* to become "fishers of men".

From the carnal to the spiritual - Mark 14:35-39 - NKJV

³⁵ He went a little farther, and fell on the ground, and prayed that if it were possible, the hour might pass from Him. ³⁶ And He said, "Abba, Father, all things *are* possible for You. Take this cup away from Me; *nevertheless*, not what I will, but what You *will.*"

³⁷ Then He came and found them sleeping, and said to Peter, "Simon, are you sleeping? Could you not watch one hour? ³⁸ Watch and pray, lest you enter into temptation. **The spirit indeed** *is* **willing, but the flesh** *is* **weak.**"

³⁹ Again He went away and prayed, and spoke the same words.

Finally, the story that we've read in Mark 14 tells us how THE POWER OF '<u>NEVERTHELESS'</u> was able to <u>change an entire world</u>:

You see, Jesus Christ was GOD wrapped in humanity.

- He knew what awaited Him in the remaining hours of His life on this earth, and <u>His human nature did not want to accept it</u>!
- He understood the pain, the emptiness, the agony that faced Him as <u>He knelt in that garden</u>.
- I know scripture tells us *"for the joy that was set before Him, [he]* <u>endured</u> the cross" (Heb. 12:2)

However, there was <u>an internal crucifixion</u> He had to go through in that garden before <u>He ever allowed Judas</u> to meet Him with a kiss.

- His human nature <u>did not</u> want to go through the agony of a <u>Roman</u> <u>crucifixion</u>.
- **His human nature <u>did not</u>** want to suffer <u>the loss of his friends</u> when He needed them the most.
- His human nature sought <u>any other means</u>---ANY OTHER---to accomplish <u>the will of the Eternal Father</u>.

Because of THE POWER OF '<u>NEVERTHELESS</u>', you and I enjoy <u>the Presence</u> of a Holy God.

Because of **THE POWER OF** '<u>NEVERTHELESS</u>', you and I have **come face-to-face** with <u>Amazing Grace</u>!

Jesus Christ wept bitter tears of opposition to what the world truly needed.

- His prayer became "Father, <u>my humanity desires</u> any possible way other than this way...<u>yet in spite of</u> what I want..."
- And through THE POWER OF '<u>NEVERTHELESS</u>', you and I can taste of the <u>Grace and Mercy</u> of a Savior that <u>surrendered His own will</u>.

Conclusion

THE POWER OF 'NEVERTHELESS' has the ability to change everything:

- It changed a dialogue, a situation, and ultimately, an entire world, <u>from</u> <u>a positive into a negative</u> by becoming a finality.
- It changed a dialogue, a situation, and an entire world, <u>from a negative</u> <u>into a positive</u> by becoming a transition point.
- And ultimately, it changed a dialogue, a situation, and an entire world, by becoming *a point of surrender* and *submission* in the Garden.

Close:

THE POWER OF '<u>NEVERTHELESS</u>' can change things for us as individuals and even as a church body.

- There are those who have said, <u>"It looked promising at first</u>, pastor, but <u>in spite of all that</u>..."
- But I choose to say, "Lord, the chairs may not be as full as I'd like for them to be right now, but <u>in spite of all that</u>..."
- It can change a dialogue, a situation, and eventually, an entire city, a nation, and yes, even a world.
