¹⁵ Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners—of <u>whom I am</u> the worst.

One of our <u>best-loved Christmas carols</u>, *White Christmas*, was written by **Irving Berlin** for a 1942 movie "Holiday Inn" starring <u>Bing Crosby and Fred Astaire</u>.

When Bing first heard Berlin audition the song in 1941, <u>he reassured Irving that he</u> <u>had created a winner</u>.

- **Bing's** preliminary evaluation <u>turned out to be a vast understatement</u>.
- White Christmas, a song of <u>peace and yearning</u> for "the ones we used to know," was released to a war-torn public during the darkest days of World War II.
- <u>By the end of the War</u> it had become the *biggest-selling single of all time*.
- White Christmas sold more than 30 million copies worldwide
- And was recognized as the **<u>best-selling single</u>** in <u>any music category</u> for more than <u>50 years</u>.

At this time of the year, it is the joy of many <u>preachers to speak</u> about the beauty of Christmas and the wonderful events that took place in Bethlehem.

Even with the **busyness and stresses of the holiday** season, everything is basically bright and light and cheery and happy for most people.

The Christmas cards that we receive present to us <u>almost a world of fantasy</u>, <u>beauty</u>, <u>wonder</u>, <u>loveliness</u> ... and <u>that is one side</u> of Christmas, without question.

But <u>without</u> putting a damper on things, we must admit that **there's also** <u>another</u> <u>side to Christmas</u>.

- There's a very ugly side.
- And there are <u>a lot of ways</u> we could approach that.
 - We could talk about:

*****A dark, cold night** in a small non-descript village in Palestine where a lovely young woman gave birth to a baby...

In the most unsanitary wretched conditions imaginable, standing in the filth and manure of a stable.

- We could talk about:

*****The ugliness of a man named Herod** who, because he feared the loss of his control and power, massacred all the babies in that region.

- We could talk about: the population in Jerusalem, totally indifferent to what God was doing, or the religious leaders who quickly grew to hate their own Messiah.

Yes, Christmas does have some ugly aspects.

But there's something even *uglier* than those things.

- Lurking behind every beautiful scene on every Christmas card
- **Behind** every <u>lovely sentiment</u> of Christmas
- Behind all of our holiday trappings
- Is something *very vile and very ugly*
- The most *wretched heinous hideous reality* in all the universe.

To have *a proper understanding* of **the beauty of Christmas**, you need to also understand *the ugliness of Christmas*.

The *dark and ugly side* of Christmas is <u>SIN</u>.

The <u>heart of Christmas</u> is this:

- That *Christ came into the world to save sinners*.
- Christ was manifest to take away sin.
- "Thou shalt call His name Jesus, for *He shall save His people from their sin*."

The real beauty of Christmas is to *understand the ugliness that it cures*!

<u>Christ's coming</u> deals with the phenomena that damns every soul to hell, <u>with the</u> <u>evil that pervades the entire world</u> – SIN!

- It is because of <u>sin</u> that <u>there are tears and pain</u> and <u>war and fighting</u> and <u>anxiety and discord</u> and <u>unrest and fear</u> and <u>worry and sickness</u> and <u>death</u> <u>and famine</u> and <u>earthquakes and pollution</u>.
- All those things which <u>mar our existence</u> are <u>the direct result of sin</u>.
 Sin disturbs and disrupts <u>every human relationship</u>, whether between man and man, man and creation, or man and God.
- Thomas Watson, the great Puritan writer said "Sin has turned beauty into deformity and the wicked takes more care to have his sin covered than cured."

Men are much more prone to excuse their sin then they are to examine it.

Christ was born to be the Savior who came to deliver men from sin.

- If there were *<u>no sin</u>* there would need to be *<u>no Christmas</u>*.
- So we cannot divorce the two -
- We cannot hide behind the fantasy
- We cannot hide behind the smoke screen of Christmas cards
- And all the rest, *sin must come to the forefront.*

Sin is the evil from which no one escapes.

- And all who die in childbirth or from heart disease or cancer or war or murder or accidents or old age or whatever else, all are dying because of <u>sin</u>.
- The Bible says, "The wages of sin is death."
 Every person on the globe will die and the blame will lay at the feet of sin.

Jesus Christ came into the world to <u>save us</u> from sin. That's the reason for His coming. <u>Sin is the ugliness of Christmas</u>!

<u>When Leonardo da Vinci</u> was preparing to paint his masterpiece which most of the world is aware of entitled "The Last Supper," <u>he sought long and diligently for</u> <u>a model</u> who could be for him the face of Jesus Christ.

At last he located a young man in one of the churches of Rome <u>who was lovely in</u> <u>life and features</u>, a young man by the name of <u>Pietro Bandenelli</u>. Years passed and the painting remained unfinished. And <u>da Vinci was able to finish</u> everything but <u>the final character</u>, who was <u>Judas Iscariot</u>.

- However, <u>he could not find a face</u> that represented to him the degradation of a Judas.
- So he looked long and hard to find a man <u>whose face was hardened and</u> <u>distorted by sin.</u>
- And at last on the streets of Rome <u>he found a beggar</u> with a face so villainous that <u>he shuddered when he looked at him</u>.
- He hired the man to sit as the model for Judas Iscariot and painted his face on the canvas.
- When he was <u>about to dismiss</u> the man he said, "By the way, I have not asked your name." To which the man replied, <u>"My name is Pietro Bandenelli</u>, I also sat for you <u>as your model of Christ</u>."

The sinful life of many years had so disfigured the man's face that the fair beauty of youth now was debased.

And that's what sin does to everyone, the whole human race.

It is the degenerative power in the human stream that <u>makes man susceptible to</u> disease, disaster, illness, death and hell.

And it is the reason for Christmas.....

Every <u>broken marriage</u>, **every** <u>disrupted home</u>, **every** <u>shattered friendship</u>, **every** <u>argument</u>, **every** <u>disagreement</u>, **every** <u>evil thought</u>, evil <u>word</u>, evil <u>deed</u>, **every** good <u>deed undone</u>, good <u>thought un-thought</u>, good <u>word unsaid</u> **can be** <u>attributed to sin</u>.

And that is why in - Joshua 7:13 CEV

¹³ Tell the people of Israel, "Tomorrow you will meet with the LORD your God, so make yourselves acceptable to worship him. **The LORD says that you have taken things that should have been destroyed.** You won't be able to stand up to your enemies until you get rid of those things.

It is compared in Scripture to the venom of snakes and the stench of a grave.

- Anything that is <u>that sinister</u> and <u>that powerful</u> and that <u>totally debilitating</u> for the whole human race <u>must be dealt with</u> -
- IF *God who was infinitely holy* is to bring man to Himself.
- Thus Christ came into the world to deal with sin.
- So, <u>you cannot</u> look at <u>Christmas and celebrate its peripheral elements</u>, you must <u>understand</u> that the heart of it <u>is the ugliness of sin</u>.

WHAT IS SIN?

- Sin is the dare of God's justice.
- Sin is the rape of God's mercy.
- It is the jeer of His patience, the sleight of His power and the contempt of His love."
- But more than that, what is sin in simple terms?

The definition of 1 John 3:4 puts it as clearly as any, "Sin is the transgression of the law." Sin is breaking God's law, any violation of God's law.

Sin is **lawlessness**.

It is living as if there were <u>no God</u> and no <u>law</u>, no <u>authority</u>, no <u>standard</u>, **just** *like people live <u>today</u>* and have <u>always wanted to live</u>.

It <u>denies</u> the reality of God's law.

- It says God is not in charge and cannot put on me a binding rule.
- It is living beyond the boundaries God has set.
- It is thinking that is <u>unacceptable to God</u>, speaking that is <u>unacceptable to</u> <u>God</u>, behavior that is <u>unacceptable to God</u>, the <u>violation of His law</u>.
- There is <u>no sane reason to violate God's law</u> other than the fact that <u>men</u> <u>desire to run their own lives</u>.... And <u>ALL of God's Law</u> is <u>for man's GOOD</u>.

WHAT IS SIN LIKE?

Sin is defiling.

- It is a <u>pollution</u> of our very souls.
- It is to precious metal <u>what rust is</u>.
- It is what <u>scars are</u> to a lovely face, what <u>stain is to silk</u> cloth, what <u>smog is to a</u> <u>clear sky</u>.
- It makes the soul red with guilt and black with evil.

In 1 Kings 8:38 the sin of man's heart is compared to *ozing sores of a deadly plague*.

In Zechariah 3:3, it is compared to *filthy garments*.

Sin is defiant.

It is clenching your fist and striking a blow in the face of Jesus Christ.

- Sin drives a nail in His hand Sin crushes a crown of thorns on His head.
- Sin jams a spear into His side Sin spits on Him Sin mocks Him.
- <u>Sin</u> says "<u>I will do what I will do, I don't care</u> who You are."

Sin is ungrateful.

Acts 17:28 says, "In Him we live and move and have our very being."

- Without God we wouldn't be here.
- Sin is such gross ingratitude because it seeks to dethrone and destroy the one who gave us all we have.
- But that's *the nature of sin*.

Sin is incurable.

Jeremiah 13:23 asks, "Can the Ethiopian change his skin or the leopard his spots?" The answer to that rhetorical question is <u>no</u>.

And then the prophet says, "Then may you also do good that are accustomed to do evil."

<u>There's nothing</u> human beings can do for themselves that can change **the effects** of sin –

Sin is humanly incurable. Sin is the incurable leprosy of the soul. It can't be legislated out - philosophized out - psychologized out - wished out - pushed out by self-effort.

Sin is a disease cured only by one thing, and that is <u>the blood of the divine</u> <u>physician Himself</u>.

Sin is hated by God.

Sin is the only thing that God has eternal hatred against.

God does not resist a man because <u>he's poor</u> or <u>ignorant</u> or <u>crippled</u> or <u>ill</u> or <u>despised by the world</u> or <u>limited in ability</u> or <u>because they seem to have little to</u> <u>offer</u>.

There's only one thing that alienates a person from God and that is sin.

Sin is hard work.

All sin causes is pain and yet people go through pain to do it.

It's a strange compulsion our nature gives to us.

Jeremiah 9:5 says, "They weary themselves committing iniquity."

- That is the essence of sin.
- It is so perverse that, *ignoring the pain and the consequences*, **men go after** evil and weary themselves in the process.
- People go to hell sweating.

Sin is bondage.

<u>Sin</u> brings us under the dominance of Satan.

- People *think that they're free*, really free to do whatever they want.
- But <u>the only free person</u> is one who has had his sin covered and is free to do what is <u>RIGHT</u>.
- A sinner is <u>not</u> free.
- He is under the **total domination of sin** and the control of Satan.

CLOSE:

But John 8:36 says, If the Son therefore shall <u>make you free</u>, ye shall be free indeed.

Ultimately, the worst thing about sin is that it sends men/women to hell!

Charles Spurgeon said, "Man is <u>hanging over the mouth of hell</u> by a solitary plank and <u>the plank is rotten</u>."

 This is the ugliness of Christmas, but thank God, it ultimately brings us to the point of its beauty, because <u>the beauty of Christmas</u> is that <u>Christ came into</u> <u>the world to save sinners!</u>

- Ezekiel Hopkins many years ago said, "It is not man's cannots but his will nots. It is not impotency but obstinacy that destroys him." *If men will not receive the cure, they will die of the sickness!*
- No matter what you may think and what warm sentiments you may have about Christmas, unless you understand the ugliness of your own sin and embrace Jesus Christ who alone can save you from that sin, you don't have the slightest connection with Christmas!

YOU CAN HAVE IT, BECAUSE JESUS CAME TO SAVE YOU!
