#### The Bait of Satan - #1

#### Luke 17 - False Teaching, Forgiveness, Faith and Service

**The 1st aspect of discipleship** here is <u>expressed in a warning</u> not to be <u>a cause</u> of sin (vs 1-3).

- It is inevitable that **sin will come** through <u>false teaching</u>.
- But woe to that person who brings it.
- The offense Jesus discusses here is <u>probably serious sin</u> that *causes* stumbling and a fall from faith.

<u>So the warning addresses teaching</u> that leads to <u>a loss of faith</u> and <u>a life of sin</u>. **God's concern for his children** is seen <u>in Jesus' characterization</u> of them **as little** ones.

In fact, those who lead others into error are at risk before God.

#### Luke 17:1 - Jesus Warns of Offenses

**17** Then He said to the disciples, "It is impossible that no <u>offenses</u> should come, but woe *to him* through whom they do come!

• Things that <u>cause people to stumble</u> are bound to come!!!!

It is one of the enemy's most deadly and deceptive traps.

- It imprisons countless Christians,
- Severs relationships and widens the existing breaches between us.

## It is <u>the trap of offense</u>

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### Psalm 55:12-14 NKJV - David laments,

"For it is not an enemy who reproaches me; then I could bear it. Nor is it one who hates me who has exalted himself against me; then I could hide from him.

13 But it was you, a man my equal, my companion and my acquaintance.

14 We took sweet counsel together, and walked to the house of God in the throng."

#### Nothing hurts more than a wound from a friend

- At times friends may need to <u>lovingly confront you</u> in order <u>to help you</u>.
- But **Betrayal** truly hurts!
- Betrayal by a friend caused David great anguish...
- <u>Don't betray</u> those you love.

**They are those whom** we sit with and sing alongside, or perhaps it is the one who is delivering the sermon.

- We **spend** holidays, **attend** social functions, and **share** offices with them.
- Or perhaps it is closer.
- We grow up with, confided in, and sleep next to them.
- *The closer the relationship*, the more <u>severe</u> the offense!
- You find *the greatest hatred* among people who were **once close**.

#### <u>Selfishness</u> reigns in our society

- Men and women today <u>look out for themselves</u> to the <u>neglect and hurt of</u> those around them.
- This should **not** surprise us.

The Bible is very clear that in the last days men will be "lovers of themselves"

### Difficult times for Christian service;

**2 Timothy 3:1-2 NIV** – But know this, that <u>in the last days</u> perilous times will come: <sup>2</sup> <u>For men will be lovers of</u> themselves, lovers of money, boasters, proud, blasphemers, disobedient to parents, unthankful, unholy,

We <u>expect this in unbelievers</u>, but Paul <u>was not</u> referring to those outside the church.

- He was talking about *those within it*.
- Many are wounded, hurt, and bitter.
- They are offended!!!!
- But they do not realize that they have fallen into <u>Satan's trap</u>.

### Is it our fault?????

**Jesus made it very clear** that it is impossible to <u>live in this world</u> and not have the opportunity **to become offended**.

- Yet most Christians are <u>shocked</u>, <u>bewildered</u>, and <u>amazed</u> when it happens.
- We believe we are the only ones who have been wronged.
- This response leaves us **vulnerable** to a <u>root of bitterness</u>.

Paul's reference to the "last days" reveals his sense of urgency.

- Remember you represent Christ!
- **Guard** your heart, mind, and words.

We must be *prepared and armed* for <u>offenses</u>, because <u>our response</u> **determines our future.** 

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## The Deceptive Trap

The **Greek word** for "offend" in Luke 17:1 comes from the word skandalon.

This word originally referred to the part of the trap to which the bait was attached.

- Hence the word signifies laying a trap in someone's way.
- In the New Testament it often describes an entrapment used by the enemy.
- Offense is a tool of the Devil to bring people into captivity.

**2 Timothy 2:24-26 NKJV - Paul instructed Timothy - <sup>24</sup>** And a servant of the Lord **must not quarrel** but be gentle to all, able to teach, patient, <sup>25</sup> in humility correcting those who are in opposition, if God perhaps will grant them repentance, so that they may know the truth, <sup>26</sup> and *that* they may come to their senses *and escape* the snare of the devil, having been taken captive by him to *do* his will.

**Those who are in** *quarrels or opposition fall into a trap and are held prisoner* to do *the devil's will*.

- Even more alarming, they're unaware of their captivity!
- <u>Like the prodigal</u> they must **come to themselves by awakening** to their true condition.

They do not realize that they are <u>spewing out bitter waters</u> rather than pure.

James 3:9-11 NKJV – <sup>9</sup> With the tongue we praise our Lord and Father, and with it we curse human beings, who have been made in God's likeness. <sup>10</sup> Out of the same mouth come praise and cursing. My brothers and sisters, this should not be. <sup>11</sup> Can both fresh water and salt water flow from the same spring?

- Our own contradictory speech often puzzles us!
- Sometimes our words are good and pleasing to God,
- But at **other times** they are <u>hurtful and destructive</u>.
- The tongue is a constant reminder of our sinful nature.

When a person is <u>deceived</u>, they believe they are right even though they are not.

No matter what the scenario is,

We can divide all offended people into two major categories:

- Those who have been treated unjustly
- Those who believe they have been treated unjustly.

**People in the second category** <u>believe</u> with all their hearts that they have been wronged.

- Often their conclusions are drawn from inaccurate information.
- Or their information is accurate, but their conclusion is distorted.
- Either way they hurt, and their understanding is darkened.
- They judge by <u>assumption</u>, <u>appearance</u>, and <u>hearsay</u>.

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# The Heart's True Condition

One way the enemy keeps a person in an offended state is to keep the offense hidden, cloaked with pride.

• Pride will keep you from admitting your true condition

## Pride keeps you from <u>dealing with</u> truth

- It **distorts** your vision.
- You never change when you think everything is fine.
- Pride hardens your heart and dims the eyes of your understanding.

It keeps you from the <a href="mailto:change of heart">change of heart</a>—repentance—which will <a href="mailto:set you free">set you free</a>…

**2 Timothy 2:24-26 NKJV** - And a servant of the Lord must not quarrel but be gentle to all, able to teach, patient, <sup>25</sup> in humility correcting those who are in opposition, if God perhaps will grant them repentance, so that they may know the truth, <sup>26</sup> and *that* they may come to their senses *and escape* the snare of the devil, having been taken captive by him to *do* his will.

#### Pride causes you to view yourself as a victim

- Your attitude becomes, "I was mistreated and misjudged -
- Therefore I am justified in my behavior."
- Because you believe you are <u>innocent and falsely accused</u> -
- You hold back forgiveness.

Though **your true heart condition** is <u>hidden from you</u> - It is **not** <u>hidden from God</u>.

- Just because <u>you were mistreated</u>, <u>you do not have permission</u> to <u>hold on</u> to <u>an offense</u>.
- Two wrongs do not make a right!

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# The Cure

In <u>the book of Revelation</u> Jesus addressed the church of Laodicea by <u>first telling</u> them **how they saw themselves** as - - -

- Rich, wealthy, and having need of nothing
- Then by exposing <u>their true condition</u>—
- "wretched, miserable, poor, blind, and naked" (Revelation 3:14-20).
- They had mistaken their financial strength for spiritual strength.
- <u>Pride</u> hid their true condition.

## Jesus told the Laodiceans how to get out of their deception:

- To buy God's gold and to see their true condition.
- Jesus' first instruction for breaking free from deception –
- Was to "buy from Me gold refined in the fire" (Revelation 3:18).

## Refined gold is soft and pliable -

- Free from <u>corrosion</u> or other <u>substances</u>.
- It is **when gold is mixed** with <u>other metals</u> (copper, iron, nickel, and so on) **that it becomes** hard, less pliable, and more corrosive.
- This mixture is called **an alloy**.

<u>The higher the percentage</u> of <u>foreign metals</u>, the <u>harder the gold becomes</u>. Immediately we see the parallel:

A pure heart is like pure gold—soft, tender, and pliable.

Hebrews 3:13 states, that hearts are hardened through the deceitfulness of sin!

If we do not deal with an offense -

It will produce more <u>fruit of sin</u>, such as <u>bitterness</u>, <u>anger</u>, and <u>resentment</u>.

- This <u>added substance</u> hardens our hearts just as <u>alloys harden gold</u>.
- This reduces or removes <u>tenderness</u>, creating a <u>loss of sensitivity</u>.
- We are hindered in our ability to hear God's voice.
- Our <u>accuracy to see</u> is **darkened.**
- This is a perfect setting for deception.

The first step in refining gold is grinding it into powder.

- Then mixing it with a substance called flux.
- Then the mixture is <u>placed in a furnace</u> and **melted by intense heat**.
- The <u>alloys and impurities</u> are <u>drawn to the flux</u> and <u>rise to the surface</u>.
- **The gold** (which is heavier) <u>remains at the bottom</u>.
- The impurities (such as copper, iron, and zinc, combined with flux) <u>is then</u> removed, yielding a pure metal.

Now look at what God says: Isaiah 48:10 NKJV - <sup>10</sup> Behold, <u>I have refined you</u>, but not as silver; <u>I have tested you</u> in the furnace of affliction.

- When your life becomes difficult, does complaining come naturally????
- This verse shows us plainly that <u>God test's us in the</u> "furnace of affliction."
- Without testing, we would never learn to trust God, nor would we grow.

And again: 1 Peter 1:6-7 NKJV - <sup>6</sup> In this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while, if need be, you have been grieved by various trials, <sup>7</sup> that the genuineness of your faith, *being* much more precious than gold that perishes, *though it is* tested by fire, may be found to praise, honor, and glory at the revelation of Jesus Christ,

• Peter mentions **trials and suffering** several times in this letter.

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<u>CLOSE</u>: <u>God refines</u> with <u>afflictions</u>, <u>trials</u>, and <u>tribulations</u>, <u>the heat of which</u> <u>separates impurities</u> such as <u>unforgiveness</u>, <u>strife</u>, <u>bitterness</u>, <u>anger</u>, <u>envy</u>, and so forth <u>from the nature</u> of God in our lives.

Sin easily hides where there is no heat of trials and afflictions.

- All believers face such trials when they let their light shine into darkness...
- We must accept trials as part of the refining process it burns up impurities.
- Under the heat of trials, however, the impurities surface.

### See Your True Condition

Jesus said our ability to see correctly is <u>another key to being freed</u> from deception.

- Often when we are offended we see ourselves as victims!!!
- And we blame those who have hurt us.
- <u>We justify</u> our <u>bitterness</u>, <u>unforgiveness</u>, <u>anger</u>, <u>envy</u>, and <u>resentment</u> *as they surface.*

Sometimes we even resent those who remind us of others who have hurt us.

#### **PRAISE TEAM:**

**Revelation 3:18** - For this reason Jesus counseled, "Anoint your eyes with eye salve, that you may see".

- See what? Your true condition!!!!! SEE THE TRUTH!!!!
- Christ was showing the Laodiceans that true value is not in material possessions but in a right relationship with God.
- You'll only repent when you stop blaming other people.

When we blame others and defend our own position, we are blind.

- We struggle to remove the speck out of our brother's eye while there is a log in ours.
- It is the revelation of truth that <u>brings freedom to us</u>.
- When the Spirit of God shows us our sin,
- He always does it in such a way that it seems separate from us.
- This brings *conviction*, not condemnation.
