The Danger of Looking Back

Genesis 19:26 – But his wife **looked back** behind him, and she became a pillar of salt.

Introduction:

- The Word of God says that Lot "pitched his tent toward Sodom,"
- But Abraham heard from God and built an altar.
- Lot and his wife had gotten <u>use to the city life</u>.
- Their life was <u>a life of fun</u>, <u>fashion</u>, and <u>parties</u>.
- They were warned by an angel to "Get outside!"
- But Lot's wife disobeyed

There is a danger in looking back... it takes your attention away from your focus

1. Lot's Wife Looked Back

A. She had too much Sodom in her, to leave it.

B. She <u>didn't want to go back</u> to small town living (to ordinary, simple living). **She was in love** with the big city life.

C. An angel told (preached to) her "<u>Look not behind thee</u>" (v.17) but <u>she</u> deliberately and <u>defiantly</u> looked back

D. Why? Was the price worth it?

Jesus said: Luke 17:32 Remember Lot's wife.

- She suddenly had become only a memory.
- A memory of <u>warning</u> to others.

2. The Children Of Ephraim Turned Back

Psalm 78:8-10 - ⁷ That they may set their hope in God, And <u>not forget</u> the works of God, But keep His commandments; ⁸ And may <u>not be like their fathers</u>, *A* <u>stubborn</u> and <u>rebellious</u> generation, *A* generation that <u>did not set its heart</u> <u>aright</u>, And whose spirit <u>was not faithful</u> to God.

⁹ The children of Ephraim, *being* armed *and* carrying bows, <u>*Turned back*</u> in the day of battle. ¹⁰ They did not keep the covenant of God; They refused to walk in His law, ¹¹ And forgot His works And His wonders that He had shown them.

A stubborn and rebellious generation

- A generation that set not their heart aright, and whose spirit was not steadfast with God.
- The children of Ephraim, being armed, and carrying bows, <u>turned back</u> in the day of battle.

They **kept not the covenant of God**, and **refused to walk** in his law

- A. They were **<u>unstable</u>** and **<u>not determined</u>**. (v. 8)
- B. Their "spirit was not steadfast with God" (v. 8)
- C. They "kept not the covenant" (v. 10)
- D. They "refused to walk in His law" (v. 10)
- E. They "<u>set not their heart aright</u>" (v. 8)

God <u>chose</u> Jerusalem in Judah to be the place <u>for the new temple</u> and <u>rejected</u> Ephraim.

- Ephraim's soldiers turned back from battle!
- God works through <u>those who are faithful</u> to Him...

We need to make sure our heart is all right!

As David said in

Psalm 57:7 - "My heart is fixed, O God, my heart is fixed: I will sing and give praise."

3. Demas Went Back

The Abandoned Apostle -

2 Timothy 4:9-10 - Be diligent to come to me quickly; ¹⁰ for <u>Demas has forsaken</u> <u>me</u>, having <u>loved this present world</u>, and has departed for Thessalonica

- Demas went back not to do evil, nor to indulge in some vile sin.
- But he just simple "loved this present world"
- **Demas had <u>left the faith</u> He had been <u>one of Paul's coworkers</u>.**
- He deserted Paul. He "loved this world."
- Demas loved <u>worldly values</u> and <u>worldly pleasures</u>.

He had another love' another love greater than his love for God

1 John 2:15 - Do Not Love the World

¹⁵ Do not love the world or the things in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him.

Some people think that worldliness only has to do with external behavior -

- The people we associate with,
- The places we go,
- The activities we enjoy.

But **worldliness affects us internally** because <u>it begins in the heart</u> and is **characterized by <u>three attitudes</u>**:

- **The lust of the flesh** preoccupation with gratifying physical desires.
- The lust of the eyes the accumulation of things. Materialism...
- The pride of life Obsession with our status or importance...

When <u>the serpent tempted Eve</u>, (Gen 3:6) he tempted her in these areas. When <u>the devil tempted Jesus</u> in the wilderness, these were also his three areas of attack. (Matthew 4:1-11).

2 Corinthians 6:17 - ¹⁷ Therefore "Come out from among them And be separate, says the Lord. Do not touch what is unclean, And I will receive you."

- Separation from the world involves more than keeping our distance from sinful practices.
- It means staying close to God.
- We are to <u>resist the sinful influences around us</u> without either <u>giving up</u> or <u>giving in</u>...

2 Timothy 2:4 - ⁴No one engaged in warfare entangles himself with the affairs of *this* life, that he may please him who enlisted him as a soldier.

• Christians are not to go back into the world!!!

What kind of example do we set to the world, our family and our children... when we lay out of church to do something else?

• All these are signs of " loving this present world "

4. Offended Disciples Turned Back

John 6:66-69 - From that *time* many of His disciples went back and walked with Him no more. ⁶⁷ Then Jesus said to the twelve, "Do you also want to go away?" ⁶⁸ But Simon Peter answered Him, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. ⁶⁹ Also we have come to believe and know that You are the Christ, the Son of the living God."

They were offended by his words:

John 6:53 - Then Jesus said to them, "Most assuredly, I say to you, *unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood*, you have no life in you.

Sometimes people are offended by what the preacher preaches --- but a preacher must **"preach the Word."**

2 Timothy 4:2-3 - ² **Preach the word!** Be ready in season *and* out of season. Convince, rebuke, exhort, with all longsuffering and teaching. ³ For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine, but according to their own desires, *because* they have itching ears, they will heap up for themselves teachers;

5. Workers In The Church Sometimes Looks Back

Luke 9:62 - ⁶² But Jesus said to him, "No one, having put his hand to the plow, and *looking back*, is fit for the kingdom of God."

What does Jesus want from us?

- Total dedication, not halfhearted commitment.
- We can't pick and choose among Jesus' ideas and follow him selectively.
- We have to accept the cross along with the crown.
- We must <u>count the cost</u> and <u>be willing to abandon</u> everything else that has given us security.

"Looking back "--- Wanting to go back--- means your heart is not in your work.

- Some people are **<u>not satisfied</u>** with the ordinary.
- They want the prestigious place.
- They want to "grandstand" as we used to say back when I played ball.
- Meaning that they were **playing to the crowd** in the stands.

God's living presence is our greatest joy.

• His radiant presence <u>helps us grow</u> in <u>strength</u>, <u>grace</u>, and <u>glory</u>...

David said in **Psalm 84:10** - ¹⁰ For a day in Your courts (**God's House**) *is* better than a thousand (**Days away from God**). I would rather be a doorkeeper in the house of my God Than dwell in the tents of wickedness. (and riches)

6. Orpah Turned Back

Naomi said, **Ruth 1:14-15** - Then they lifted up their voices and wept again; and Orpah kissed her mother-in-law, but Ruth clung to her. ¹⁵ And she said **"Look your sister-in-law has gone back** to her people and to her

¹⁵ And she said, **"Look, your sister-in-law** <u>has gone back</u> to her people and to her gods;

Verse 14 - " Orpah kissed her mother in law; but Ruth clung to her. "

There are 2 categories...the kissers and the cleavers---which category are we in?

- Orpha went back to her heathen family and her heathen life.
- Orpha went back to obscurity. Ruth went on to greatness.
- Orpah did not want to do what she knew was right.

7. Many Turn Back In Their Hearts

Stephen preaching about how the Jewish nations treated Jesus said:

<u>Israel Rebels Against God</u> – Acts 7:39 - whom our fathers <u>would not obey</u>, but <u>rejected</u>. And in their hearts <u>they turned back</u> to Egypt,

- They <u>pushed God away</u>!!!
- "In <u>their hearts</u> turned back " --- they were backsliders at heart.

Returning to Egypt, with its bondage and slavery, that was their desire.

• That was <u>what they wanted</u>.

Proverbs 26:11 - ¹¹ Dogs return to eat their vomit, **just as fools repeat their foolishness.**

CLOSE:

Stephen was an effective administrator and messenger before becoming a martyr

This is clear from the defense he made before the Jewish high council (the Sanhedrin).

He presented a summary of <u>the Jews' own history</u> and <u>made powerful</u> <u>applications</u> **that stung his listeners**.

During his defense **Stephen must have known** he was speaking his own death sentence.

Members of the council could not stand to have their evil motives exposed.

- They stoned him to death while he prayed for their forgiveness.
- His final words show how much like Jesus he had become in just a short time.

Stephen's life is a continual challenge to all Christians

He was the first to die for his faith, and his sacrifice raises questions:

- How many risks do we take in being Jesus' followers?
- Would we be willing to die for him?

If not, Are we really living for him?

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
