Just Preach Faith, It Works!

In **Titus chapter 1** we find a letter *written by the apostle Paul to Titus*.

Historians say that **Paul was responding** to a letter that Titus had sent to him.

Titus was the pastor of the church in Crete. And while pasturing this church <u>he</u> <u>became discouraged</u>, so he sat down and wrote Paul a letter.

Dear Paul,

Greetings in Jesus name! I trust this finds you doing well. I just wanted to write a few lines to tell you that I really appreciate you. I am thankful for your leadership. I am thankful for your confidence both in me and in my ministry. As you know, I am pasturing the church in Crete. And that's why I am writing to

you. It seems like pasturing is not as exciting as it used to be. There has been so many things going on in the church that -

I have become just a little bit discouraged.

When you came and preached to us a few months ago, you hit the nail on the head. And it seemed to help for a little while, but it wasn't long until things begin to stir up again.

I have discovered that not everybody can be trusted. I have discovered that there are some folks who attend the church I am pasturing that are not saved and even some board members for that matter.

Paul, I am really concerned about this church. I preach the best I can and sometimes folks don't even say Amen. And there have been a few times when not only did they not say Amen, but they didn't even look Amen.

It seems like every time I get in the pulpit and preach Jesus Christ and Him crucified that things get all stirred up again.

Folks are looking right through me, and they don't seem to want to respond to the Word of God, but they would rather sit back and <u>dwell on the negative</u> and <u>find fault</u> with others in the church and especially with the preacher.

Paul, all I'm trying to say is that <u>I'm frustrated</u>, <u>I am weary</u> in well doing, <u>I am</u> <u>discouraged</u> and <u>I sure could use a word of advice</u>. Sincerely, Titus *I don't know everything Titus went through* while pastor in Crete, but I do know that whatever he went through must have <u>weighed very heavy on his mind</u> and <u>spirit</u>. And it must have been a struggle from time to time.

He must have felt like the man who wrote, "what happens to a dream deferred, does it dry up like a raison in the sun, fester like a sore and then run or does it stink like rotten meat"

- > What do you do when your dreams dry up like a raison in the sun?
- What do you do when you're doing the best you know how but nothing seems to get any better?
- What do you do when you're doing the best you can, but things seem to get worse?
- What do you do when you feel like the unknown but wise author who wrote; "to live above with saints we love, oh that will be glory, but to live below with church like we know, well, that's another story"?

Titus must have felt like he was in a situation that just wasn't getting any better.

There is not one person **who has not struggled** to <u>the point of frustration</u> at one time or another. There is not one person who has not been <u>through some difficult</u> <u>times</u> <u>while doing their best</u>, that they have not battled with <u>the spirit of</u> <u>discouragement</u>.

Every preacher fights the spirit of <u>weariness</u>, <u>discouragement</u>, and <u>frustration</u>. Because <u>we are in a battle</u> for <u>the souls of mankind</u>.

We are forced to deal with <u>negative situations that can lock us up</u> and cause us to <u>want to give up</u>.

The spirit of giving up comes with <u>two symptoms</u>.

- 1. We will either *loose our perspective*
- 2. Or we will *lay our religion down*

The Bible says that John the Baptist was locked up. <u>He was locked up</u> and <u>he was</u> <u>ready to give up</u>. Because he was ready to give up, he lost his perspective. He's been doing his best to preach the Word of God, and <u>now he finds himself</u> <u>sitting in jail</u>.

The Bible says, <u>he lost his perspective</u>, and he sent two disciples to Jesus to find out if <u>He was really the Messiah</u> or not or should we wait on another.

We can find ourselves <u>locked up in a negative situation</u> in our churches that can cause us <u>to lose our perspective</u> on <u>the grace and mercy of Jesus Christ</u> and <u>on</u> <u>the power of the Spirit of God</u>.

If we lose our perspective, it can cause us to lay our religion down.

In other words, *it can <u>cause us to become so frustrated</u>* with it that <u>we become</u> <u>tired of it</u>, and <u>we walk away from it</u>.

The Bible says that the Israelites were locked up in Babylon. [Psalm 137]

Psalm 137 - A Prayer for Revenge

¹Beside the rivers of Babylon we thought about Jerusalem, and we sat down and cried. ² We hung our small harps on the willow trees. ³ Our enemies had brought us here as their prisoners; now they wanted us to sing and entertain them. *They insulted us and shouted, "Sing about Zion!"*

⁴ *Here in a foreign land, how can we sing about the Lord?* ⁵ Jerusalem, if I forget you, let my right hand go limp. ⁶ Let my tongue stick to the roof of my mouth *if I don't think about you above all else.*

⁷ Our Lord, punish the Edomites! On the day Jerusalem fell, they shouted, *"Completely destroy the city! Tear down every building!"* ⁸ Babylon, you are doomed! I pray the Lord's blessings on anyone who punishes you for what you did to us. ⁹ May the Lord bless everyone who beats your children against the rocks!

The Bible says that the Babylonian captives came along and asked, *why don't you sing like you used to sing when you were in Jerusalem?* Why don't you sing the songs of Zion?

• The Bible says that they had laid their religion down and they hung their harps on the willows and asked; "how can we sing the Lord's song in a strange land".

- If we are not careful, we can get so *locked up in negative stuff* that we just want to give up.
- I want to <u>encourage you</u>, **don't stop** working for the Kingdom of God. **Don't stop sharing the message of mercy and grace**.
- God's anointing is still upon you! I understand how tiring it can become.
- I understand that we can <u>struggle with weariness</u>, because it seems like you have to do it by yourself.
- I understand that there are problems in the church/families/life...
- I understand that there are folks who just come to church but *never become like Jesus* no matter how hard you preach.
- Whatever you do, don't lose your perspective. Don't hang your harps on the willows. But <u>keep on preaching faith because it works</u>. It will bring revival to your church/family/job/life...
- Statistics say that the average pastor in America only pastors for 2 years because the stress level is so high.
- We must deal with things that the average person doesn't deal with every day. So it is as Christians as well...
- We need to be reminded that <u>God is bigger</u> than the stuff that we have to deal with.
- God is bigger than <u>any circumstance</u>. God is bigger than <u>all the opinions</u>.
- Just preach faith, it works!
- It will storm through the gates of hell. It will turn your city upside down. It will turn your church inside out. *If you'll just preach faith, it will work!*
- It will run the devil away. <u>It will uproot spirits</u> that are hindering the move of the Spirit of God. <u>It will kill the spirit of divorce</u>. <u>It will destroy the spirit</u> <u>of adultery</u>. *It will completely remove the spirits of <u>gossip</u>, <u>pride</u>, <u>and</u> <u>bitterness</u>.*

If you'll just preach faith, it will fill the altars, it will fill the baptistery,

It will bring the harvest that you've been trusting God for.

• I encourage you - preach faith - it will bring *miracles*, *signs*, and *wonders*.

Historians say that in the early part of the 19th century that <u>archeologists</u> <u>discovered some remains in the city of Crete</u> and in those remains there were great shrines, foundations of great churches, and **guess whose name was at the bottom of those shrines.**

It was Titus! You know why because he wouldn't give up.

- He would not hang his harp on the willows.
- He would not lose his perspective and God built a church.

So I encourage you preacher, go back to your church.

- Get back in that pulpit.
- God back and deal with all the stuff that you as a pastor have to deal with.
- And I dare you to preach faith. I dare you to preach Jesus Christ and Him crucified.
- It will crush the spirit of confusion.
- God will give you a harvest.

Remember the letter to Paul - Paul, all I'm trying to say is that <u>I'm frustrated</u>, <u>I</u> <u>am weary</u> in well doing, <u>I am discouraged</u> and I sure could use a word of advice.

Though you may be tired and weary, God has not forsaken you. He didn't put you somewhere so you could struggle but <u>He does have a plan</u> and you are part of it.

Just preach faith - it works!
