How To Handle a Shipwreck

Ship-Wrecked but Not Dead

Acts 27:9-11 - ⁹ Much time had been lost, and sailing had already become dangerous because by now it was after the Day of Atonement. So, Paul warned them, ¹⁰ "Men, I can see that our voyage is going to be disastrous and bring great loss to ship and cargo, and to our own lives also."

¹¹ But the centurion, instead of listening to what Paul said, followed the advice of the pilot and of the owner of the ship.

- We began this message with *Paul advising* or telling them *not to sail* - -
- How many know *We don't always listen to wise counsel*?

They didn't listen and they *sailed directly into the storm of their lives* -They lightened the ship!

There's nothing like a bad storm for realigning priorities.

- <u>Somebody</u> ought to lift your hands right now and say:
- I'm going to make it!!!
- I know I'm not everything I should be...
- But <u>I know I'm moving in the right direction</u>!!!

You don't even look like you have been through what you've been through.

• So, Just Keep Walking!

Acts 28:1-6 - <u>You're going through</u>. After the wreck a viper attached to Paul. The Bible says that <u>Paul shook off the beast</u>.

- Paul <u>shook that viper off</u> into the Fire.
- You need to ask yourself, are you living <u>close enough to the fire</u>?

Somebody listening to me, <u>The devil has sent something</u> out to try and destroy you, but <u>it's not going to kill you because</u> you're turning up the heat.

Somebody listening to this message right now: You know it should have killed you, you know if the devil had his way, you'd be dead,

<u>Today</u> I want to share with you from scripture: Acts 27:13-26 <u>The Storm</u> - Acts 27:27-30 <u>The Shipwreck</u>

When we begin to <u>examine</u> the very rugged <u>life of the great apostle Paul</u>. Several <u>things that he endured</u> come to mind.

- **He was** <u>beaten, stoned, thrown in jail, mocked, ridiculed, his ministry</u> <u>techniques questioned</u>.
- Two of the more famous: <u>SNAKEBIT & SHIPWRECKED</u>.

I can personally say for myself, because *<u>I can't stand snakes</u>*...

- I would rather take my chances on a **shipwreck**.
- Though neither of the two sound very inviting.

In many ways, <u>the storm **Paul and his companions encountered in Acts 27**</u> developed along the lines of <u>what meteorologists consider a perfect storm</u>.

In recent history, such a storm occurred *in the waters of the North Atlantic*.

In 1991, volatile fronts from the north, the east, the west, and the south converged off the coast of Massachusetts, creating such a threatening combination of hurricane force winds and towering waves that the entire East Coast went scrambling for cover.

- *Numerous fishing vessels <u>retreated</u>* to safer waters.
- Writer <u>Sebastien Junger</u>, in his book <u>The Perfect Storm</u>, tells the tale of an illfated ship named <u>Andrea Gail</u>,
- The *captain & crew* vanished without a trace.

Junger's <u>dramatic retelling</u> of that <u>freak combination of weather elements</u>, in a single storm system <u>eerily resembles</u> what <u>Luke describes in Acts 27</u>.

Northeaster – Acts 27:13-14 - ¹³ When a gentle south wind began to blow, they saw their opportunity; so they weighed anchor and sailed along the shore of Crete. ¹⁴ Before very long, a wind of hurricane force, called the <u>Northeaster</u>, swept down from the island.

• What Paul experienced <u>was not on land</u>, but rather on sea.

Paul's Storm –

- The storm grew so violent in its intensity that <u>they began to throw the</u> <u>cargo overboard</u>.
- Until eventually *they were forced to even <u>throw over the ships tackle</u>*
- Which rendered the vessel **<u>helpless</u>**, and *impossible to control*.

To make matters worse, *the thick canopy dark clouds* <u>blocked any view</u> of the constellations, which normally <u>served as a reliable navigational guide</u>.

Survival now in question, especially as the battle against the winds continued relentlessly for days.

Finally, the storm-weary crew <u>caught a ray of hope.</u> Luke writes: The Shipwreck -

Acts 27:27-30 – ²⁷ On the fourteenth night <u>we were still being driven across the</u> <u>Adriatic Sea</u>, when <u>about midnight the sailors sensed they were approaching</u> <u>land</u>. ²⁸ They took soundings and found that the water was a hundred and twenty feet deep. <u>A short time later they took soundings again and found it was ninety</u> feet deep. ²⁹ <u>Fearing that we would be dashed against the rocks</u>, they <u>dropped</u> <u>four anchors</u> from the stern and <u>prayed for daylight</u>. ³⁰ In an attempt to escape from the ship, the sailors let the lifeboat down into the sea, pretending they were going to lower some anchors from the bow.

- What lesson can we learn from Acts 27?
- Storms will Come God understands our fear.

We may feel anxious and afraid in our storms, <u>but if we look to God</u>, He will strengthen and encourage us.

His Word is food for our souls *in times of fear and darkness*, and *He offers His Holy Spirit to guide us.*

Somewhere down the road <u>if you live long enough</u>, you are going to <u>experience</u> <u>some kind of storm</u> in your life. <u>The storm is inevitable</u>.

- At times like Paul, you may even <u>question your own survival</u>.
- Questions and doubt *begin to emerge as* fear grows within.
- You may even panic.

What are you going to do when you must face your very own Northeaster.

- <u>What</u> do you do? <u>How</u> do you go on?
- I beg you today to do what Paul, and the crew did in vs 29...

Acts 27:29 - *Fearing that we would be dashed against the rocks*, they <u>dropped</u> <u>four anchors</u> from the stern and <u>prayed for daylight</u>.

Notice they threw out <u>four anchors</u>.

- Today I offer you four anchors to help stabilize you in your storm.
- You will need these anchors when the bad news comes.
- You need these four anchors to keep you from drifting into despair.

1. <u>Anchor of Stability</u> - *Notice these verses:*

Acts 27:20-23 - ²⁰ When neither sun nor stars appeared for many days and the storm continued raging, we finally gave up all hope of being saved. ²¹ After they had gone a long time without food, Paul stood up before them and said: "Men, you should have taken my advice not to sail from Crete; then you would have spared yourselves this damage and loss. ²² But now I urge you to keep up your courage, because not one of you will be lost; only the ship will be destroyed. ²³ Last night an angel of the God to whom I belong and whom I serve stood beside me.

The Anchor of Stability Holds Firm when your Navigation System fails!

- It's easy to lose your bearings in the storm.
- You can't find your way through your circumstances,
- Like Luke records "All hope of being saved is abandoned"
- That is when you *must drop the anchor of stability*...
- <u>Stability</u> is found in God!!

Facing intense adversity Paul says "Be of good cheer... keep up your courage.

• I've heard from the Lord!" I know it doesn't seem like the time to be cheery.

- ²² Because <u>not one of you</u> will be lost; <u>only the ship</u> will be destroyed.
- It is in that Word from the Lord that we must trust and find stability !!

GOD'S WORD NEVER FAILS! HE CANNOT LIE!

2. Anchor of Unity - Notice these verses- The Shipwreck – Acts 27:30-31

³⁰ In an attempt to escape from the ship, the sailors let the lifeboat down into the sea, pretending they were going to lower some anchors from the bow. ³¹ Then Paul said to the centurion and the soldiers, *"Unless these men stay with the ship, you cannot be saved."*

The scene shows <u>desperate men</u> under <u>extreme pressure</u> and <u>danger</u> who thought about escaping the ship.

- <u>The temptation</u> was strong <u>to flee the ship</u>.
- But that's no way to survive a storm.
- <u>You can't run</u> from your problems.
- Paul told them, *in order to ensure our survival,* we *must* abide in the ship. Paul knew that they all needed each other to survive the storm.
 - <u>When</u> life's storms start blowing....
 - **Don't let the devil** blow apart your marriage and your family.
 - Certainly, don't let him keep you out of the house of God
 - It's in those moments <u>you need to drop</u> the Anchor of Unity!!
 - **Don't** jump ship!!
 - Don't backslid DROP ANCHOR!!

3. <u>Anchor of Renewal</u> - Look at these interesting verses:

Acts 27:33-36 - ³³ Just before dawn Paul urged them all to eat. "For the last fourteen days," he said, "you have been in constant suspense and have gone without food—you haven't eaten anything. ³⁴ Now I urge you to take some food. You need it to survive. Not one of you will lose a single hair from his head." ³⁵ After he said this, he took some bread and gave thanks to God in front of them all. Then he broke it and began to eat. ³⁶ They were all encouraged and ate some food themselves.

Can you imagine *fighting a storm for 2 weeks* and *getting no nourishment*?

- That's what these men were experiencing.
- When we get *physically weak*, *emotionally drained*, and *unable to sleep*.
- It's time to Drop the Anchor of Renewal.
- The anchor of renewal helps keep us going and alert.

But first he prayed. Can you imagine that scene....

- The storm is raging all around them and Paul leads 300 men in prayer!!
- Awesome!! After they pray, they eat....
- This is a symbol of a great <u>spiritual diet</u>....
- <u>A prayer life</u> and ingesting *the preached word of God*....
- I tell you friend that it is an Anchor of Renewal to your soul!!

4. <u>Anchor of Reality</u> – Acts 27:41-44 - ⁴¹ But the ship struck a sandbar and ran aground. The bow stuck fast and would not move, and the stern was broken to pieces by the pounding of the surf. ⁴² The soldiers planned to kill the prisoners to prevent any of them from swimming away and escaping. ⁴³ But the centurion wanted to spare Paul's life and kept them from carrying out their plan. He ordered those who could swim to jump overboard first and get to land. ⁴⁴ The rest were to get there on planks or on other pieces of the ship. *In this way everyone reached land safely*.

<u>Reality</u>!! Now was the time to swim to the shore!!

- <u>*Reality*</u> screamed <u>the ship is literally being broken apart</u>!! It's <u>time to move</u>.
- The anchor of reality is often dropped in our lap to remind us of the time we are living in....
- <u>Reality says</u> that <u>Jesus is</u> coming back...It's time to <u>get busy</u>!!
- It's time to do something for God!!

All the men in the ship began to take action when action needed to be taken !!

- This should be *in the life* of the child of God!!
- **<u>Reality</u>** should <u>cause us</u> to be <u>better soul winners for GOD</u>.

<u>**REALITY</u></u> - God is Faithful –** The faithfulness of God means God is unchanging in His nature, true to his Word, has promised salvation to his people, and will keep his promise forever.</u>

He is worthy of eternal trust no matter how unlikely his promises seem.

Let's pause long enough to do the math - *How many started the voyage? How many were promised they'd make it? How many made it safely to shore?* <u>Answer 276</u>.

God is faithful!
